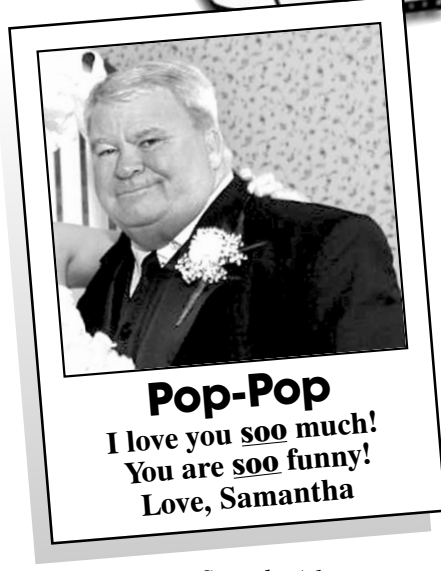

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4th narc gets desk duty in alleged misconduct probe

A fourth narcotics officer has been placed on desk duty in connection with an expanding FBI and Internal Affairs investigation into allegations of police misconduct.

Officer Thomas Tolstoy, a 10-year veteran of the force, was taken off the street and forced to relinquish his police-issued weapon late last week, said Internal Affairs Chief Inspector Anthony DiLacqua. DiLacqua cited the ongoing probe but declined to elaborate.

Meanwhile, as the probe enters its fifth month, a growing number of criminal cases have been put on hold in the wake of a Feb. 9 *Daily News* article that detailed allegations that Officer Jeffrey Cujdik — Tolstoy's fellow squad member — lied on search-warrant applications to get into targeted drug homes.

Dozens of search warrants connected to the elite narcotics squad are now in question, forcing drug suspects into legal limbo. Prosecutors have asked judges

to postpone open criminal cases involving Cujdik, pending outcome of the FBI and Internal Affairs investigation.

During a court hearing yesterday, Assistant Public Defender Bradley S. Bridge likened the experience to "treading water."

Bridge's comment prompted Common Pleas Judge Sheila Woods-Skipper to respond, "I don't know how long the treading will last."

Assistant District Attorney Robin B. Godfrey explained that the investigation is "under the control of the federal government" and that she had no idea when it would conclude.

Bridge is seeking to reopen the cases of 53 convicted drug defendants — 11 of whom are in prison.

Bridge asked Woods-Skipper to set bail for jailed defendants who are waiting to hear if they can get a new trial.

Bridge agreed to file individual bail petitions in each case by next week. Woods-Skipper set a June 19 date to hear bail motions.

The three other officers on desk duty are: Cujdik, his brother, Richard, and Robert McDonnell. ★

Man surrenders in fatal hit-run

A North Philadelphia man has been charged with homicide by vehicle for a fatal hit-and-run earlier this month that killed the son of a prominent city jazz drummer.

At 1:30 a.m. yesterday, police said Donta Johnson, 25, surrendered at Police Headquarters and claimed that he had been driving the minivan that struck Calvin Dominique Weston-Wilkerson around 2 a.m. May 7 at 9th Street and Roosevelt Boulevard.

Weston-Wilkerson, 18, was the son of city jazz drummer Calvin Weston, who has toured with such notables as Billy Martin of Medeski, Martin and Wood.

Weston's son was crossing 9th Street when a dark-colored minivan traveling northbound on the

Boulevard struck him and failed to stop, according to police.

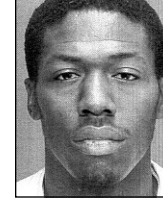
Weston-Wilkerson was taken to Temple University Hospital, where he was pronounced dead within 20 minutes.

The following day, police said they were called to Cottman Avenue near Crispin Street in Northeast Philadelphia, where a woman told them her 1994 green Dodge Caravan was taken without her permission. The van was recovered that day about six blocks away on

Leon Street near Shelmire Avenue.

Police would not comment on Johnson's relationship to the owner of the vehicle, but he and the owner reside at the same address.

Along with the homicide by vehicle charge, Johnson has also been charged with accidents involving death, driving without a license and related crimes. ★
